
#### Game Changers: BHS Students Drive Innovation and Leadership




2024 has truly been a year of excellence, creativity, and community for the English faculty. We look forward to building on these successes in 2025!

# Bowral High's PDHPE Faculty: A Year of Innovation, Engagement, and Achievements in 2024

The faculty undertook a comprehensive review of the 7-10 scope and sequences, integrating Writing in Secondary strategies and developing consistent literacy practices across Years 7-12. This focus on literacy aims to support student understanding of key concepts, verbs and improve overall academic outcomes in PDHPE. Additionally, the senior PDHPE course has been superseded by the new Health & Movement Science course, with teachers participating in professional learning opportunities online to prepare for its full implementation in 2025.

The faculty also strengthened its links with local primary schools through collaborative initiatives, such as visits, gala day participation, and the provision of coaching programs led by Year 10 PASS and Sport, Lifestyle and Recreation students. These efforts have not only provided valuable learning experiences for primary school students but also helped build stronger relationships within the community.

The CHS Knockout sports program continued to be a key part of the school's sporting culture, focusing on developing commitment, sportsmanship, and a strong sense of participation. Staff members from across the school volunteered as coaches, fostering positive interactions with students. Year 11 Hospitality



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## Wellbeing

This year marked significant strides for Bowral High School's wellbeing program, with a strong focus on tackling bullying and building student resilience. Thanks to our partnership with Highlands Youth Services, we were able to continue offering equine therapy, a unique form of therapy involving interactions with horses to improve mental health and emotional wellbeing. Equine therapy has proven beneficial in helping students develop trust, empathy, and coping skills.

We also implemented the "We All Matter" program, aimed at fostering inclusivity and respect among students, and the "Rock and Water" program, which focuses on building resilience and self-confidence through physical and mental exercises. Resilience, particularly for young people, is about developing the ability to recover from setbacks, adapt well to change, and keep going in the face of adversity.

Additionally, we celebrated Harmony Day, a significant event where we educate students about understanding and appreciating different cultures to build a multicultural society. The highlight of the day was the food stalls, where students could try dishes from various nations. We were also fortunate to have Daniel Mirza, author of "Getting the Monkeys Off Your Back," speak to our students. This platform allows students to anonymously report instances of bullying, ensuring that they receive timely support. My role involves triaging these reports and coordinating with relevant staff to address each situation promptly, ensuring that students facing challenges receive the help they need as quickly as possible.
