

# Local Schools, Local Decisions (LSLD)

In 2012, the NSW Government announced its Local Schools, Local Decisions (LSLD) reform for NSW public schools. This reform places students at the centre of school decision making. It gives principals and school communities a greater say over how they use the available resources to best meet the needs of their students.

To enable the shift of resources to the school level, a Resource Allocation Model (RAM) has been developed. The RAM provides a simper, fairer and more transparent distribution of government school funding and changes the way resources are managed in our school system.

On 21 October 2015, the NSW Premier the Hon Mike Baird MP and the Minister for Education the Hon Adrian Piccoli announced the next phase of the RAM implementation. In 2016, \$113 million in additional funding has been allocated to NSW public schools through the RAM. These additional funds have been allocated in a way consistent with the recommendations of the Gonski Review.

In 2016, NSW public schools will receive a base allocation for professional learning and funding for each student using a new methodology. Schools will continue to receive equity loadings for socioeconomic background, Aboriginal background, English language proficiency and low level adjustment for disability.

Eligible schools will also continue to receive a location allocation in 2016 to address the additional costs faced by NSW public schools that are geographically remote or isolated.

Our school has been advised that we will receive \$351,165 RAM equity funding to support our students with additional learning needs in 2016 and \$216,038 in the new base allocation.

The school will executive will continue to work with our school community to determine the best ways to use these resources to support student learning.



# Alan Davidson Shield Open Boys Cricket CHS - Round 3 Match Report

On 30 October, the Bowral HS team were hosted by Eden Marine High School for the South Coast Region quarter-final match of the state knock-out cricket competition. Eden won the toss and elected to bat.

From the outset, Eden made their intention clear that they would score aggressively. Despite some early opportunities (including **Matthew Bates** being declined the prized early wicket of their top scorer on a no-ball) Eden accumulated consistently at a steady 7 runs/over. The Eden captain and opening batsman, **Dylan Jordan**, played a magnificent innings, plundering 183 runs (n.o.) of their hefty total of 8/282. His innings was a display of quality power hitting, including twenty 4's and six mighty 6's. Dylan has played first grade for Canberra University in the ACT and represented country NSW in elite youth cricket competitions and can bat. Bowral bowlers tried their hardest in an effort to curb the carnage; **Ryan Dignan** (2/8), **Kyle Jesshope** (2/51) and **Joel McAloon**(1/30) (all spin bowlers) and **Sam McIllhaton** (2/47 – "seamer"), were the BHS wicket takers.

Confronted with a humungous target and the early loss of opener **Mitchell Stanmore** ("Mr Dependable"), Sam McIllhaton "the other opener", was resolute in his approach. Sam made a chanceless 102 runs. His deft placement of shots and smart running between wickets (56 runs coming in 2's) was punctuated with a crisp shot to the boundary when the occasional loose ball came his way. **Cameron Malcolm** and **Joshua Miller** were valiant, with hard hitting contributions of 29 and 30 respectively, however failing in the bid to give their team hope. The Bowral reply of all out for 203 would be usually enough to win most 40 over schoolboys games – but this was no ordinary match. Both teams were congratulated for playing entertaining cricket in the spirit of the game.

A pre-4am start, 800km return drive, 11pm finish and a six hour cricket game (with nearly 500 runs scored) somewhere in between, made for a big, big day. The players and I are very much appreciative of the commitment and effort of **Mr Molloy's** (parent) and **Mr Cox's** (teacher) assistance in transport, scoring and umpiring – again, thank you very much Gavin and Yarran.

#### Ticket prices:

Each series is \$100 which represents excellent value for money at \$25 a concert. Prices have remained unchanged from last year. **Transport arrangements** will remain the same in 2016: train travel from Bowral Station and returning to Mittagong or Bowral stations only. **Student workshops:** For Year 11 and 12 students, there is a student/teacher workshop on each of the programs which costs \$25 per student for each workshop. Dates are: Meet the Music 1 series: 19/2 and Meet the Music 2 series: 26/2. See Ms Ware for permission notes.

# Recommended BYOD Device - the 'Chromebook'

All students are strongly encouraged to purchase or lease a 'Chromebook'. A 'Chromebook' is a paired back laptop that uses, as its operating system, 'Chrome OS'; it is designed to be used primarily with an internet connection and accesses software apps and data storage via the internet 'cloud' with some being available when internet is not accessible.

On request, if a student has purchased a Chromebook they are eligible for use of a school locker, depending on availability, for secure storage of their Chromebook. A padlock will need to be provided by the student, however the usual 500 Vivo fee will be waived.

For ease of purchase, the school has negotiated two online purchase portals. Both have options to buy outright or with finance, as well as with accessories.

The first portal is "**Learning with Technologies**". This purchase portal can be accessed through: <a href="http://bowralhs.orderportal.com.au">http://bowralhs.orderportal.com.au</a>

All purchases made through the Learning with Technologies will be eligible for free delivery to the school. First round of purchases close on the 30/11/2015 with delivery mid-December. The second round closes 31/12/2015 with delivery late January for the start of 2016 school year.

The second portal is through **JB Hi-Fi Solutions BYOD.** This purchase portal can be accessed through: <a href="https://www.jbeducation.com.au/byod">https://www.jbeducation.com.au/byod</a> and entering the unique code: **BOW2015.** 

The cost of the recommended 'Chromebook' starts at approximately \$350 or around \$6 per week for lease arrangements. Parents will also need to purchase a suitable protective casing for the device and a USB Drive. We strongly encourage parents to purchase insurance against loss, damage or theft of the device. These options are available for purchase through the online BYOD purchase portal.

### Why a Chromebook?

After considerable investigation, the school has recommended the purchase of the Chromebook as the preferred BYOD device because of advantages over other options in the areas of;

- affordability
- longer battery life
- ease of use
- weight
- equitable access to applications used at the school (web-based 'apps').

Students who participate in the BYOD program will be required to sign a Student Electronic Device User Agreement and abide by the terms of the BYOD Acceptable Usage Policy. The User Agreement must be returned to the school with the device details. Students who have their BYOD application approved will automatically have permission to bring their device for use at school using the school's wireless network infrastructure.
